




Third Annual KNW Easter Egg Hunt

TORNADO PREPAREDNESS

iMap Weather Radio App



You can now have a weather radio on your iPhone. It will alert you when bad weather is headed your way. News On 6 is giving away the app FREE to the first 50,000 people. You can get the News On 6 iPhone Weather Radio App by texting TRAVIS to 79640 and following the directions. Special thanks to News On 6 for making this app free...it's normally \$9.99.

Android Weather App

Simple Weather Alert is a free app for Android phone users. It monitors the NWS for your area and will alert you when there is severe weather headed your way. You can set it to flash lights, and ring bells when a tornado warning is issued for your area. Click [here](#) to download.



Weather Call



No smart phone? No problem, you can sign up for Weather Call. It will call your phone and alert you when bad weather is headed your way. You can choose what alerts you receive and which phones as well as emails are alerted. Weather call does cost a small fee (\$6.95 a year), but is worth the price. With no early warning system in the rural areas, this system could save your family's life. Sign up [here](#).



STORM TRACKERS

You can ride along with professional storm chasers from the safety of your computer in real time. This website gives you a radar of the storms along with the location of all the storm trackers. PRECAUTIONS TO TAKE DURING A TORNADO

- Go to a pre-designated shelter area such as a safe room, basement, storm cellar, or the lowest building level. (Tell at least 3 friends where your safe place is located in case there is debris and you are unable to get out, so they will know where to look for you.)
- If there is no basement, go to the center of an interior room on the lowest level (closet, interior hallway) away from corners, windows, doors, and outside walls. Put as many walls as possible between you and the outside.
- Put on sturdy shoes.
- Put on a helmet (motorcycle, bicycle) to protect your head.
- Cover yourself with a mattress.
- Do not open windows.
- In a high-rise building, go to a small interior room or hallway on the lowest floor possible.
- If in a mobile home, get out immediately and go to the lowest floor of a sturdy, nearby building or a storm shelter. Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornadoes.
- Never try to outrun a tornado in urban or congested areas in a car or truck. Instead, leave the vehicle immediately for safe shelter.
- Do not get under an overpass or bridge. You are safer in a low, flat location.



IDENTITY THEFT

TIPS ON HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF

Crooks use clever schemes to defraud millions of people around the globe every year. They often combine sophisticated technology with age-old tricks to get people to send money or give out personal information. Many scammers insist that you wire money, or pressure you to make an important decision on the spot. Don't fall for such tactics. Use these tips to help you avoid common scams.

Don't send money to someone you don't know. Not an online seller you've never heard of — nor an online love interest who asks for money. If you buy items through an online auction, consider using an option that provides protection, like a credit card.

Never pay fees now for the promise of a big pay-off later — whether it's for a loan, a job, or a so-called prize. Don't agree to deposit a check and wire money back.

No matter how convincing the story. By law, banks have to make funds from deposited checks available within days, but uncovering a fake check can take weeks. If a check turns out to be a fake, you're responsible for paying back the bank.

Don't reply to messages asking for personal or financial information. That goes whether the message comes as an email, a phone call, a text message, or an ad. Don't click on links or call phone

numbers included in the message, either. It's called phishing. The crooks behind these messages are trying to trick you into revealing sensitive information.

Don't play a foreign lottery.

Messages that tout your chances of winning a foreign lottery, or messages that claim you've already won can be so tempting. Inevitably, you're asked to pay "taxes," "fees," or "customs duties" to collect your prize. It's illegal to play a foreign lottery.

Report Online Scams

If you think you may have been scammed:

First, file a complaint with the FTC at <https://www.ftccomplaintassistant.gov/>. Complaints are entered into an online database used by hundreds of law enforcement agencies in the U.S. and abroad.


Second, report scams to our state Attorney General at 405-521-3921 or www.oag.state.ok.us/ and local law enforcement.

If you receive unsolicited email offers or spam, send the messages to spam@uce.gov.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU SUSPECT IDENTITY THEFT

1. Call all your financial institutions and alert them to the situation.
2. Contact the three major credit bureaus and discuss whether you need to place a fraud alert on your file, which will help prevent thieves from opening a new account in your name.

Help emergency crews find your house quicker with Green Reflective signs that go on your mailbox or a post at the end of your drive.



In our rural area, when there is an emergency, time is critical. Our first responders have expressed frustration over trying to find homes that are not clearly marked. Sadly some of the house numbers in several areas of our community don't even go in order. This slows the first responders efforts to help you.

As you can see in the picture above, even if you have the numbers written on the side of your mailbox, they will not be visible at night.

KNW has partnered with a company to help us assist you in getting your house clearly


marked. They are letting us have the signs at cost. The signs are heavy duty with quality vinyl letters. They have been tested to stand up to hurricane force winds. We have even had one hit directly by a car - the mailbox pole was bent, but the sign and its numbers came through without a scratch.
